FESTIVAL FEATUR

As per usual I was unable to make the whole Festival due to other commitments of a band nature, but I was glad that I had set Sunday aside for this feast of R n R and Rockin blues. Twinwood Bowl near Bedford was the venue for this year's Rhythm Festival, famous for the fact that this was the aerodrome that Glen Miller took his last flight from. Destination; Bermuda

The Festival is a three day affair spanning two stages with loads of reasonably priced concessions, camping area and a great sound system and lighting rig. Jim Driver is the impresario of the event and had put together an impressive (and no doubt expensive) lineup including on this nights agenda the Killer himself Jerry Lee Lewis. Also, on the main stage Nine Below Zero, the Blues Band featuring Paul Jones and those knees up rockers Chas & Dave (and Mick).



Having taken a diversion from the M25, we arrived too late to see the opening number from Nine Below but we caught the second half of the set which

demonstrated that good time British blues is very much alive and kicking. Some good tunes played with real enthusiasm and talent that kept the crowd at the front of the stage clapping and singing throughout their set. Calls for encores were unfortunately ignored as I presume time restraints were placed on the acts to keep the show rolling to time.

Time for another Guinness and a burger while the stage was set for the Blues Band, who were apparently delayed from a gig in Scotland. The Band arrived on stage on time and for me were very pedestrian, possibly "jet lagged"! However, ardent fans seemed to be

happy with their hour long stint. Enough said. The Guinness had now run out at the bar but a nice pint of local bitter was a good substitute in the absence of the iron intake. Next up the inimitable pub rockers, Chas and Dave. Come on admit it, you've all done a shimmy around your aunt's lounge to The Sideboard Song or Gercha at some point? No, well neither have I then !!! The trio kicked off with "Wallop" featuring some great piano from Chas, even though the sound guy was struggling a little with the overall mix, which until now had been spot on. All the hits and more delighted the crowd of circa two thousand, including a great version of "Rabbit". Those purists of R'n'R will no doubt be gnashing their teeth at the thought of C & D being

associated with Rockin' but hey, music is meant to be fun and these guys put a smile on a lot of people's mushes. A great show, again with some great musicianship on exhibition.

By now the sun was dipping below the rim of the Bowl and the crowd, who had been generally stuck to their fishing chairs for most of the day, meandered closer to the stage front in anticipation of the arrival



of Jerry Lee. It had been rumored that this would be his last trip to Europe, so I was curious as to why there weren't too many of the Rockin' scene in the crowd. Perhaps more recent poor performances had put people off !?

The stage was now set and the band members wandered on in their smart black and white attire. The grand piano sat centre stage waiting to be pounded by the "Killer" in person. Mr. Lovelace introduced the Band and kicked off the show with Honey Don't ably sung by the drummer. The crowd however were pointing their cameras at the wings of the stage where Kate Moss and Pete (was' his name from rehab) were standing with some other "C" list OK Mag populaters. But then, the real, authentic, talented star, ambled onto the apron and what a reception he got. There was the main event, although looking his full years and slow in gait, he got straight onto the 88 and rocked through a set of all the classics. Jerry Lee's playing was, although a little laboured at times, faultless. He is grasping onto the magic still and still rattles out the lyrics with a hint of passion through the now croaky larynx. All in all his show was very enjoyable, if only for being in the company of a true legend. Set complete JLL meandered from the stage in the same way he came on, leaving the Band to play the send off. A good day out, I'll certainly be booking for next year.

Charlie Gracie

THIS BUTTERFLY IS FLITTING AROUND THE UK

Charlie Gracie is one of a diminishing number of rock-n-roll innovators, who continues to actively perform. A native of South Philadelphia, he became the first successful recording star of the "Rock Era" to emerge from that neighborhood. In 1957, Charlie's 'Butterfly' topped the American and British music charts, selling over 3 million copies. His other late fifties big sellers include: 'Fabulous', 'Ninety-Nine Ways', 'Wanderin Eyes' and 'I Love You So Much It Hurts'. These hits bankrolled Philly's famous Cameo-Parkway record label, making it a dominant force in the music industry for nearly a decade! At the height of his fame, Charlie frequently appeared on 'Dick Clark's American Bandstand'. 'The Ed Sullivan Show', and 'Alan Freed's TV Specials'. He headlined shows at the Brooklyn Paramount, the Casino Royale in Washington, The 500 Club in Atlantic City, and Old Connie Mack Stadium in Philadelphia. Charlie's star burned even brighter in Great Britain where he became the second American artist to bring rock-n-roll to the English concert stage. Preceded only by Bill Haley, Charlie headlined the London Palladium and Hippodrome receiving outstanding receptions from the press and public. To this day, Charlie Gracie, is a much loved and respected performer the length and breadth of the United Kingdom.

While Charlie has earned a place in rock music history, this is only one dimension to a career that spans forty years. His versatility makes him the consummate music man! Today, Charlie enjoys a strong following at clubs and resorts along the northeast corridor of the U.S. Twice, annually, he performs to large audiences in countries such as: England, Italy, Germany, Austria, Finland, Spain and Holland. His superb guitar playing elicits the highest of praise from music legends like George Harrison. The ex-Beatle referred to Charlie's

guitar work as 'brilliant' in a March 1996 interview with Billboard Magazine. Paul McCartney paid tribute to Charlie by Recording an updated version of 'Fabulous' in his new 1999 CD series entitled: "Run Devil Run". McCartney honored Charlie again that fall by inviting him to the album's premiere party in London.

The year 2000 found Charlie on the road with Irish blues rocker, Van Morrison. Van, another Charlie Gracie admirer, commissioned him to open his shows at the Wiltern in Los Angeles and The House of Blues in Las Vegas. A short time later, Graham Nash of Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young fame, declared that Charlie inspired him to a musical career. Nash then proceeded to contribute vocally on Charlie's latest CD releasehis first of the new Millennium.

It is obvious why Charlie Gracie has lasted the course longer than most. He is an accomplished musician and an exceptional talent - a devoted family man who conducts himself as a gentleman both on stage and off. He is a credit to his industry. *Charlie was voted into Great Britain's Rockn-Roll Hall of Fame (1998) founded by "Now Dig This" magazine. 

THE RAT PACK

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Arsen Roulette and The Drugstore Romeos B52 Diner, Southend Airport Sat 24th June 2006

From hence they came! No from California via Europe and then they tore up the UK like any good rockabilly hurricane. On a recent and very quick tour of the UK I caught Arsen Roulette and the Drugstore Cowboys featuring Nick Hoadley on Bass from The Cordwood Draggers who was the only stand in and had been touring with the band for a month.

The gig at the B52 was the last of three in and around the London area and as it was a sort of last minute thing so I had wondered about the attendance. Well I arrived at a quarter to eight and the place was pretty much half full with thirty or so out side in the grounds as well



so my fears were allayed and I settled in to enjoy the evening.

Radar as usual got the evening off to a great start with some well known ditty's that had everyone tappin' their feet (remembering the B52 is not a dance venue although there is a

tiny dance area) he still managed to get the place rockin'.

And so it came to pass that with the absence of cardboard Spike still on everyone's minds that the real Spike took to the mic to introduce our visitors with their name written on his hand (which everybody noticed by the way) in his usual way he abused the waiting throng and introduced the band who launched into their first number with Matt on guitar kicking it off, well as any good promoter Spike was too afraid to turn around and face the audience and not until the final note and the screams and cheers from the crowd did our host finally relax and get into his usual whip em up mode. I don't know why he was worried according to a friend the band had sold twelve cd's at sound check so there you go it really is all about the audience.

The band's new CD on El Toro and their T shirts practically flew out of the bag an incredible response for any band but according to Nick it was like this all round Europe. The boys set a good mix of new and old consisted of Love Me Never Leave Me, Boppin' Lil' Betty, Bop-a-Lena, Strollin Back То You, Bip, Bop, Boom, Gone Crazy and Honey Hush, the two sets ended in six encores and a half naked Arsen and Spike trying to convince the Drummer to take his shirt off too, with the help of a very excited audience. What a night it was true rockin at its best clothes on or off these guys really know how to rock it right in the UK, so much so that they will feature at Hemsby in a future event.

The guys have a very authentic sound, Arsens vocals are full of that American drawl and his stage presence is hypnotic, Matt The drugstore romeos guitarist is probably one of the best guitarists on the circuit and all in all the band were enjoyed by everyone. Not a complaint, a criticism a bum note or a whistle from the PA incredible. I'd be glad to welcome Arsen Roulette and The Drugstore Cowboys back any day. **Mad Rat.**









Hello once again

Doo-Wop and original 50's Rhythm & Blues Rockin' music.

I come across a tendency that some people associate 50's & 60's music together when in reality the whole start and emergence for both decades was different.

The late 40's and during the 50's was the first time Youth could identify with their own music, it was the first time that it was commercially viable to have a new source of buyers for the major and many independent recording labels.

Many Radio Stations in the States were playing the new music to the new generation.

The only rock n roll to be heard on UK Radio was controlled by the BBC, or if you were lucky enough to get AFN or later, Radio Luxemburg, you might have heard a poor Medium Wave signal with lots of whine and whistle over some tracks played there.

The sixties attempted to stamp out Rock n Roll in the form of scapegoating certain promoters and DJ's with the Payola scandal trials. This softened and sanitised the music which became in some instances quite bland or dire.

During this period in the UK, Rock n Roll and its followers went sort of underground until the late sixties when New 50's Rock n roll Bands were forming, people of my generation became interested and a resurgence of Rockabilly and the original sounds began. This was known as the "Rock n Roll Revival" period or "Second generation". Radio was silent for the most part for Rock n Roll

Clubs were formed, such as "the Vintage Rock n Roll Society" of which other organisers affiliated to, RnR DJ's started playing the music in pubs and at organised events across the UK.

In the 70's the Rock n Roll scene had grown, Teddy Boys were back both old and second generation, the Rockers and Bikers who had always been around were also part of that shared liking for 50's Rock n Roll, though it was not all dayglow as perceived now by many, although there was an element of that as portrayed by the media.

Fed up with the lack of our music on the Radio, a March on BBC's Broadcasting House was organised primarily by Stuart Coleman and Geoff Barker which was successful in gaining a Saturday Slot on Radio One, weekly at 6pm.

The eighties saw a diversity of genre's with peoples preference for rock n roll emerge, some went in a more specialised direction, Some of these factions were generated from a crossover between Punk Rock, Phychobilly and neo Rockabilly.

The Teds were still strong in number, and then there was the US Hepcat and sodapop influence, plus a following for

The Radio One program continued for a few years with a series of "It's Rock n Roll" programs hosted by Stuart Coleman

The nineties saw another change in the scene but only the occasional local Radio station had any Rock n Roll programming, however the Midlands BBC Regional stations had "The Big Bopper" who had a weekly program for a couple of years playing tracks from rockin' bands, interviews with people involved on the scene and requests from listeners.

The Millennium continued with More CD's being obtainable; more Bands were emerging that wrote their own material. The internet began to attract a listening audience for Local, National and global RnR information, Radio and contacts.

Some, like Rocket Radio, started to stream specialist programming, other stations too, such as Radio Caroline and shows such as Dell Richardson's Good Rockin' tonight (and his former station slots) were available for the UK and Europe via Satellite as well as being webcast.

Mark LaMarr had a series of about 12 one hour specialist shows on the BBC each year which could also be heard on the Internet

I started my shows on Northern Broadcasting in 2002

During 2000, Rockabilly Radio started playing tracks by independent artists and bands of the Genre on the Internet, (Which I later joined in 2004).

Geoff Barker has a Saturday Show on Local BBC Radio which can also be heard on the Net.

Recently a few local stations have started to have Rock n Roll as part of their specialist evening programming, most notably Forest FM which is one of the New Community Radio Stations putting out two Rockin programs weekly being webcast.



WEEKENDER REVIEW

Rock 'n' Roll, Boogaloo style was the name of the game for this Boogaloo Promotions' first foray into the presentation of Rock 'n' Roll weekenders in collaboration with Warners. On the back of the extremely successful Jump Jive & Boogie & Blues weekends, the event just had to be equally successful and guess what....it was. The event had sold out weeks before deadline encouraged no doubt by a entertainment line-up of mixed blends of Rock 'n' Roll including the Rat Pack, Big Boy Bloater, The Borderlines, Jean Vincent, The Alleycats and Mike Berry and the Outlaws plus dance lessons, late night jam sessions, retro market and some quality DJing and MCing by yours truly.

The Friday night kicked off well with the Alleycats providing a good mix of R'n'R classics to an enthusiastic crowd of Rock 'n' Roll fans and Warner regulars. The dance floor was constantly busy through the ninety minute set where Drew and the crew pulled out all the favourites and stops to keep the crowd entertained. The following act was Ms Jean Vincent & her band Memphis in the Meantime, who played some good rockin' stuff but didn't keep the audience on their toes quite as well as the Alleycats, more due to the punters being tired from travelling than the performance.

After a few tunes from the decks at Midnight, I put my Jam leader hat on and strolled around to the lounge bar to start up the late night jam with colleagues Rollin' Jimmy on guitar and Paul Moules on electric bass. Jim kicked off the Jam with a few classics before inviting members of the audience to jump up and join in with Drew and Butch from the Alleycats and the guys from Jeanie's band helping out and a couple of guys from the crowd who got up, namely Keith on piano and Martin on bass. These guys proved to be extremely helpful throughout the weekend in keeping the Jams going way into the night and beyond. Thanks fellas.

Saturday arrived too soon and with it emerged the retro market featuring stalls from Runicorn Records and memorabilia plus clothes and other 50s stuff, which was appreciated with interest by the rockin' and non-rockin' guests.

After my record hop in the afternoon and a quick siesta it was on with the glad rags and on duty again to present Saturday's goodies. First up was the phenomenal Borderlines. A new group to me who really gave it their all. They are a 3 piece outfit that consist of familiar faces on the scene and just play Rock 'n' Roll how it should be played, with passion. Jim the guitarist switches from guitar to piano with equal talent and pushes the show along with great aplomb. I didn't need to call for an encore, the crowd beat me too it. Book this band!!

After 30 mins of Jivers, Strollers and more jivers from moi, it was time to introduce that colossus of R'n'B; Big Boy Bloater, who got the crowd in the palm of his hand from the off. A good set of dance floor stompers, which was greeted with delight by the crowd. Again, encore call not really required but I can't resist being on stage with a mike in my hand! Jam time again, following a similar format, but with a bigger audience. Word had obviously got around about Jimmy's incredible guitar style and that he could drink more lager than anyone else. Mark and Jim from the Borderlines joined in and almost played a whole new set. At about 2a.m. Mick and Spike from the Rat Pack arrived, following their gig in London. Within two sips of a pint they were both up and jamming some good ol' rockin' tunes with me on the kit. We finished at 4a.m. and left a few stragglers in the bar contemplating if it was worth going to bed or not!?

Sunday started off a little hazy and a day of rest was had by the Jam Band and MC, however for those who don't imbibe quite as much, there were dance classes to participate in and a few stalls to part with some cash. In addition, this venue has other facilities such as swimming pool, archery, shooting, bowls and more.

8.30.p.m - the tables were cleared and the floor was open to all for another good nights' entertainment. The billing of Rat Pack had caused a bit of confusion to some guests who were expecting the trio from the legendary Sands of Las Vegas, however I introduced them as from the legendary sands of Southend-on-Sea, which caused a titter from the crowd. The Rat Pack didn't mess around, they came in hard and fast and got the floor buzzin' straight away, although I did see some fingers in ears from the older generation, due to volume rather than performance. 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THE NOTORIOUS BETTIE PAGE A film review by Wilkdat Mike

Bettie Page has found a niche in the consciousness of the rockin' crowd in the last few years, although sometimes one wonders whether that interest is more because she more often than not posed in a variety of exotic lingerie than anything else.

No doubt anyone who goes to see this film will have to contend with a handful of lecherous males in the audience, and I must admit to more than a passing interest in beautiful women wearing silk and satin lingerie! However, after a while those base desires tend to take a back seat as one discovers that actually this is a bloody well made film!

Notorious is a lovingly rendered film and Gretchen Mol is utterly convincing, it's easy to believe that Gretchen Mol IS Bettie, even though she doesn't really look like her. But it's also a very honest per-



formance, with Mol cheerfully recreating some of Bettie's most famous poses - which these days seem more comic than erotic.

Bettie Page was, of course, a real person and a world famous pin-up. Mary Harron, who cowrote the script with Guinevere Turner, takes us back to Bettie's beginnings in the Deep South. A good girl, Betty dreams of being a actress, but is also a

quiet, intelligent A student. After an early unsuccessful marriage, and being sexually assaulted, Bettie leaves the South and heads for New York where she takes acting classes.

Her acting career goes nowhere, though she meets a nice boy, Marvin, but poses for a photographer who she meets on the beach. Her willingness to strip off, and the vitality and joy that she radiated in shots soon found her work, mainly with the Klaws who run a small fetish studio and make films for private clients. Bettie's sweet, cheerful good-nature sees nothing wrong in posing in leather and stilettos, pretending to hit other models with a riding crop - as long as she's happy and making others happy, its fine with her. Gradually her work becomes better and better known, and eventually her fame causes some conflicts between her and Marvin. Of course, this being the repressive 1950s, police are constantly on the look out for anything of a sexual nature, and when the Klaws - and consequently Bettie find themselves the



subject of a senatorial investigation Bettie's notoriety was assured - and her career over.

The only problem with the film it's that it never really seems to get under Bettie's skin. There are hints that she was abused as a child; as an adult she exudes natural sexuality and an innocently healthy quality; she also never, ever seems to question what she's doing, even when she's posing bound with a snooker ball in her mouth. She seems to love Marvin, but we're never sure what their living arrangements are, or if they plan to marry; she also cheats on him when on vacation in Florida. Visually it's a treat, with Harron recreating a noir feel for New York, reminiscent of Good Night and Good Luck, contrasting with Bettie's trips to Florida, filmed in garish Technicolor like South Pacific.


But there are no real emotional highs or lows, very little depth to Bettie's character. Quite often one sits there wondering why the main character does this or that or why certain people acted the way they did, and the film sadly, doesn't provide the answers. The film is good, but could have been so much better, if it had portrayed the events and the political machinations behind them in more depth, rather than just gloss over most of them.





Brandon; plays the drums. Has played for 6+ years, also has experience with Ice Cold/Darrel Higham on the slap bass trying to follow in his dads footsteps (Nick Hoadley, Cordwood Draggers)



He also has cut records with other bands and currently works with the band (Midnight Shift) and also helps other bands, so basically a session

worker, so if ya need him get in touch and I'm sure the band will let him go for a night or two!!.

Think, Sun Records and that is their sound. They keep things very raw and basic...

Think, early Elvis, Carl Perkins. Midnight Shift play rockabilly but are adapting and adding some rock and roll classics to play for the jivers amongst us. Midnight Shift were originally a four piece family rock and roll band but it was disbanded after the skins and strings decided to either have more children or go to America and get married! Midnight Shift originally started with George playing with his son who was learning guitar in his shed (sorry office!). Colin was into classical guitar and played mostly to himself and anyone else that was curious enough to listen. Then one day George asked if he would go along and add a bit of lead. This was quite a change for Colin who was not used to playing with a bit of plastic on steel strings.

At first they couldn't even do one song together, but after many hours of listening to early Elvis and reading about Scotty Moore's style. Colin bought a thumb pick and was able to play Mystery Train. Wayne, (George's son) was by then able to string along three chords and between them they made a reasonable sound. George's daughter was then asked to play drums, and despite never having played before, she approached it with her usual enthusiasm, learned to play... after mishaps and moving on, we've found a new drummer Brandon. After much thought, Midnight Shift are pleased to announce that Brandon has agreed to join as the regular drummer... not yet in his twenties, we see him as an asset who can only improve with age and experience, already with experience, this can't be hard!

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Welcome to 'Duke's Bar', a place where you can relax with your drink of choice and talk rockabilly while tucking into your favourite meal. All this in an establishment that was designed as it would have been in the early to mid 1950s. Meet Duke your barman, you can bend his ear on most subjects' rockabilly, but more than likely he will dig information out of you.

It was as hot as hell last week and I was in the bar early, filling shelves and checking stock, but mainly I was there to feel the benefit of the air-conditioning. While I was cleaning some Jack Daniels' Old No 7 nip glasses, I noticed a yellow 1954 Cadillac coupe Deville pulling into the car park. After a brief period of jealousy, I noticed my buddy Phil White was the driver. After all those years he has finally got his pride and joy on the road.

Every time we bump into each other we talk rockabilly music and although we both love it, our opinions on it differ greatly.

Phil is five years younger than I am (so that makes him a very young dude), but we got into the rockin' scene at about the same time. Our paths must have crossed several times over the years but it was only just recently that we became friends and realised how different our views were on the rockin' scene of today were.

I offered him a Kronenbourg 1664 (I wanted to get him talking), but he asked for a fruit smoothie and vegetarian salad. Cool, I'll pick his brains over breakfast. I got the conversation started by asking what lead him down the rockabilly path. He took a sip of his smoothie, considered the question carefully, and then replied;

"I first got into rock 'n' roll in 1976 when I was 11 years old. I found the music in the 1970's had nothing to offer me and got into the '50's stuff first from a friend called Ricky Appleby and then from a number of people at my school. There was a rock 'n' roll club at lunchtimes run by a teacher who taught us to dance, but this was closed down, I believe, due to objections from other teachers as they didn't like Ted's, and for other reasons (put it this way, it was an early example of political correctness). The first club I went to was 'The

Lyceum' in the Strand when I had reached the grand age of twelve! Sometimes I was let in other times I bunked in! I saw Crazy Cavan and the Rhythm Rockers there, and Shakin' Stevens and the Sunsets. I quickly moved more to the American look of baseball jacket and Levi red tags (502's not 501's) and when the rockabilly thing became a breakaway group from the Ted's I was there. This was about summer 1977 when we were fighting the Punks (one thing I really regret in my life, it was wrong)."

I told Phil that I thought most of us that were around at the time felt regrets about what we got up to along Kings Road in Chelsea at the time. They (Punk Rockers) were rebelling against the music that was around at the time, as the Teddy Boys did back in the 1950's.

Phil complemented me on the salad and then carried on with his story;

"I was and still am into British motorbikes and did dress as a rocker at times (oh, oh, from plastic Ted to plastic Rocker!!). I stuck with the scene apart from being into the Cramps and then the Meteors for a very short time in 1980 - 1981."

I responded by saying I never did get into the Cramps myself, although I do know that they put a lot of people around at the time on to rockabilly music. The Meteors I never got at all. Phil drank some more of his smoothie, shrugged his shoulders and continued.

"During the 1980's I got so entrenched in the scene that I really didn't know what was going on in the then current music scene apart from the few rockin' acts that got in the charts (I was, and still am, good mates with Tim and Phil Polecat). But I think the Stray Cats were one of the worst things that happened to the scene - awful band and an awful influence on the scene. I could go on forever with my opinions on them!"

I told Phil that on the subject of the Stray Cats I believe they did a good thing for rockabilly, but maybe not musically. I like some of their material, but most for me was to heavy and some of Brain Setzer's songs were to similar (I am being diplo-

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matic here) to 1950's recordings to sound anything like an original tune! But one thing they did do was making the record companies dig into their vaults and re-release old rockabilly tracks that were long deleted from sales. I also saw Crazy Cavan and the Rhythm Rockers and Shakin' Stevens and the Sunsets back in the 1970's too, but back then Shaky spoke with a Welsh accent, not the Memphis drawl he picked up after finding fame in the 1980's. Shaky music also made record companies dig into their archives in search of rare and hidden tracks. The downside to this was the fact that they also re-released a lot of bad tunes too.

I decided to spice the conversation up a bit by asking Phil what he thought of modern rockabilly bands. This was his reply;

"My opinion on modern rockabilly bands is that they are boring and they are boring to watch, they either do covers so close to the original fifties recordings that there is no point to them at all. Or they throw modern songs in (by modern I mean post '59!), what's all this 'Hey Joe' rubbish about? I haven't seen a good stage act on the rockin' scene for years. And why oh why do the D.J.'s play records by these new bands? Especially covers of great original records. The northern soul scene doesn't do this; it is all about the original



music and before you ask Duke, I don't care for northern soul, but I like the purity of that scene."

After Phil explained that he mentioned Northern Soul as a comparison, I clicked into what he was getting at.

Okay now for the carrot, what did he think was the ultimate 1950's Rockabilly recording?

"As for the perfect recording from an original rockabilly artist it is so hard to pick one. Let me first say that I would be quite content to spend the rest

of my life listening to Gene Vincent and nothing else!! 'Bebopalula' is my all time favourite record, however he is really in a category of his own, not strictly rockabilly. So it would have to be Jack Earls, or Pat Cupp, or Charlie Feathers, or Mac Curtis, or Carl

Perkins, or Roy Orbison (most of the Sun stuff anyway), oh yeah, that other bloke Elvis - the first and best rockabilly (king of rock 'n' roll where Gene is the GOD of rock 'n' roll!). If you need to ask why I like this stuff you'll never get it!"

Now this is where Phil and I totally agree with each other. We both saw Jack Earls at the Rave and straight away we agreed that what we saw was excellent.

But with my next question, we ended back at square one. I asked Phil what he thought of the rockin' scene at present.

"Ho, ho, ho, it's bloody awful and, in Britain especially, it's dying on its feet. It has been so watered down with the emphasis in the clubs being around so few records and a large dose of bad sixties garage and modern bands' records. The only young people into it are the kids of people my age who are on the scene. Most of the girls and a lot of the blokes make no effort to dress rockin'. Don't those tattoos look bad after a few years eh?"

(Phil smiles every time he sees my bad Elvis tattoo).

"Lets hear the brilliant original records again and could the D.J.'s please stop playing from the same play list. There is room for new stuff* on the scene, but somewhere along the line the important stuff (original rockabilly music) has got lost. I have no problem with people having different tastes in music to me, but when I pay to go to a rockabilly gig, that's what I want to hear, not the Sonics, Johnny Cash's last album (nothing wrong with it, but not rockabilly) or 'Word up'. There is so much good stuff that people on the scene now have never heard."

I had to agree with Phil there, I am always coming across music that I have not heard before and the records that I bopped to when I was 16 (Slow Down - Jack Earls, If I Had Me A Woman - Mac Curtis, etc.) I still listen to now, although the boppin' ceased a few years ago.

Phil finished his food, drained the last of his smoothie, left a handsome tip, said his goodbyes and drove off in his '54 yellow Cadillac coupe

Deville and once again my jealously returned.

I wondered to myself who my next rockin' customer would be, I get so many of them in here these days, all willing to answer my questions as long as the drinks keep flowing. Tune in next month to find out...

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* Phil explains more. "What I meant about that there is room for new stuff is that the scene should still be based mainly around the original stuff? The scene will never be new and wild again as we are dealing with a musical style that is over 50 years old now. However, there is room for new bands and records whether I like them or not, but I really feel the emphasis should be on all that original stuff, as I feel that the scene has really lost it's way. I have already said how I think the scene has been watered down with sixties garage etc. During the early 1980's when bands like 'The Polecats', 'The Deltas', 'The Bluecats', etc. were big I don't recall their records being played at the clubs (mainly original stuff was played) but they were a great live draw. They had an exciting stage presence that is sorely missing in today's bands, even though some of today's bands have a more 'authentic' sound they are boring to watch. Why do I want to hear a new band do a note for note cover of a Sun record when I can listen to (the superior) original record? Also why are those 1970's-1980's bands written off as 'neo rockabilly', I can assure you that they were 100 % into the original stuff.

Now to the new bands that you mention, I'm pretty sure that I have seen them all, but I must admit that I was under-whelmed by them all. The only one that I really remember out of the ones you have mentioned in the past is 'The Go Getters'. Sorry Pete, you seem like a nice bloke but I have seen your band three times and the only thing that sticks in my mind is a very poor cover of a Ramones track. 'The Ramones' were a great band, but were firmly influenced by the early sixties Phil Spector wall of sound, not rockabilly. It brings to mind mistakes made by 'The Polecats' with likes of' 'John I'm Only Dancing'.

Why is it that many a new rockabilly band only comes into their own when backing an original artist like the late Ronnie Dawson, or Jack Earls etc.? I think it is because those original artists put the zing into the stage show - they have stage presence or charisma (whatever you want to call it).

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
